

# Johrden felt forgotten ... until you believed in him and gave him a second chance

Johrden and his siblings were raised by a disabled mother. "She struggled to provide for her children in a rough neighborhood." Their father was rarely in the picture.

After high school he went to Bluefield College, but when a loan was declined, he couldn't pay the tuition and transferred to Norfolk State University. He is majoring in Social Work, remembering a Social Worker who helped his family in a rough time. He attended classes, worked part-time, and lived with his grandfather, but when the home went into foreclosure, he had to drop out of school. He moved in with a cousin and then with his father until his dad said, "You need to go to the Mission" and drove him to its doors.

"There was always the problem of finding a consistent place to live, dealing with family issues, back and forth to friends' houses, finding employment, and always struggling finding somewhere to live." "I never imagined being in a shelter or being homeless. My first thought was to try and get a job, a roommate, and get out as soon as possible. I was by myself and kind of lost. When you come

to a shelter you believe certain people don't believe in you anymore. You are the forgotten one."



Then Johrden joined the David Program for young men. "Mr. Metcalf (Director) didn't give up on us and believed in us. You could call him at midnight when everybody was sleeping and he listened to you. He is a father figure to me and the other Davids. I also learned about brotherhood. When you hear someone else's story who had it worse than you did, you realize you don't have it so bad."

"I am learning to be more in tune with God, apply it to everyday life and to reach out and ask for help when I need it. Mr. Metcalf teaches us to help in the community, putting someone else first who might not have what you have. But everything doesn't happen

overnight. I am learning patience and to trust in God. My goal is to graduate college

and do non-profit work in the neighborhood I came from where resources are limited. I also want to get a job and a place to live."

Today Johrden is taking 15 credits at Norfolk State, working 30 hours a week, and saving money. "You have to learn how to forgive people when your heart is hurt about things in your past and move forward."

"I tell other young men to think about what you are grateful for and be grateful for what you have."

"Your contributions are very important. They help someone who was lost to become a better person, a good citizen ... and for those who have no faith, to become closer to God."

# Without you ... Sandra says, "I would probably be in the streets."

Sandra dropped out of school in the 11th grade to get married. Her husband joined the Coast Guard and for 20 years they moved from place to place. They had three sons, but the marriage ended in divorce after 28 years.

In 2003 Sandra married again. "We were very happy together until he became very ill and died in 2007. We didn't even have four




