

"The Union Mission has really done a lot for me. They really cared about my sickness, in and

out of the hospital. And the Wellness Team: oh my goodness! Those nurses are a true blessing! They are very, very good with [coordinating] all the medication I take every day. They are amazing ladies! I'm gonna miss them when I leave. And all the Men's Shelter Managers are great people: enthusiastic, warm, friendly! What has really amazed me is all their testimonies.... *It really threw me for a loop that you can see people walking* around here who don't look like they've been through anything. And I said, 'Wow! Look at how God can bless! If He can bless them, He can bless me!"

Connie

"I was so angry, I didn't want anything to do with God for a long time. I thankfully became homeless because I found this place—and

they brought me back to God.... It's been so uplifting to be here. To hear the staff talk about God, they are smiles from ear to ear. It is so wonderful. You can't help but have some of it rub off on you. I learned so much about how I need to walk with Jesus."



### **RECLAIM Resident**

"I did more drinking than I should and eventually that caught up with me at the job. So I was on my own, on the streets, living at hotels, spending up what little money I did have left.... I was at rock bottom in my life when I came here, but the intake manager told me, 'We don't judge. We help.' ... Ever since I've been here it's been nothing but help, help, help. I would have been in a much better situation if I had just come here earlier!"

"The Mission is helping me to 'be still and know He is God.' The staff show me [to] put God first and foremost. It helps me be a better woman and role model."

From Beantown

Cometimes coming home isn't a homecoming. Darrell learned that when he returned to Norfolk after living in Boston for three decades.

In his youth, "my family was in chaos!" he says. His mother died when he was just three. His father, though loving, "was a full-fledged alcoholic," so Darrell and his siblings had to live with extended family for months at a time. "We had to put up with a lot of madness."

Though he grew up in church, Darrell "had to figure life out myself. I had to experience a lot of negative things from people, and I didn't have no one to talk to when things went bad."

Looking for stability after he graduated from high school, Darrell joined the Army. He served as a supply clerk for his 2 1/2-year enlistment, but "it was not something that I wanted to do all my life." But Darrell did find a lifelong passion: dancing. He trained in ballet, modern, tap, and jazz, and performed as lead dancer in a trio and in Broadway musicals. "It was one of the best experiences that I ever had!"

At age 33, he moved to Boston to teach dance. Instead, he graduated from the culinary arts program at Boston University, where he built a successful career in food service and management.

He also met his "wonderful wife." Over the next 28 years, they raised her two girls and their daughter in a family

that was close-knit, churchgoing, and full of love. But after five years together, Darrell discovered that she had a secret cocaine addiction. In time, he, his wife, and the courts agreed that he should have custody of their daughters. He didn't want child support. He just wanted the girls to be safe and his wife "to do what she needs to do to get her life in order."

## "I know that God has a plan for everyone who's still living!"

Sadly, she couldn't. Despite his wife's repeated attempts to get clean on her own, "I just couldn't stomach it anymore. I've been trying to get her help to overcome that for years." Last fall, Darrell felt he had to tell his wife that he could no longer deal with her drug use. He was going to have to leave.

In November 2020, Darrell moved back to Norfolk. His wife supported his choice. Despite their differences, "we still have a great relationship! We're just not living in the same household."

He had planned to stay with his sister for a while. That did not work out. With "nowhere else to go," Darrell lived in his car for three months.

"I prayed so hard!" Finally, his brother's pastor suggested that he try The Union Mission.

For five months now, Darrell has been grateful for a safe place to stay, free meals, daily showers, and real help. "I had anxiety when I was living in my car," but the mental health resources "have been great!" And through the Mission's Wellness Program "I'm doing everything I can to keep my health strong." As he and his case manager plan his future, "I know that if I keep going the way I'm going now, following the Lord's lead, I will get my life together."

Darrell wants to stay near Virginia Beach so that his family will have a fun place to visit. "I truly, truly want to get an apartment," and his Social Security and veteran's benefits will help him find housing. He hopes to work again in food service part-time. And he hopes his wife will do better, too.

"You don't always have to have it all together. You are never too old to learn. By being here, I'm very optimistic about things getting better for me!"

## In the Magi's Foolsteps One Christmas Eve a mother told her young daughter how Jesus received only three gifts for His birthday—and that she should be grateful for whatever she found under the tree in the morning. Her daughter innocently challenged, "But don't you think He asked Santa why none of them were toys?"


Every December, our Nativity scenes usually include the three kings who brought gifts from the East. Most of what we know about these wise men comes from the book of Matthew, but do our modern-day displays reflect the truths of Scripture? Here's what Dr. Mark L. Ward, Jr. says we might consider.

## There may not have been three wise men.

Because the magi brought at least three famous gifts—gold, frankincense, and myrrh—we often assume that each gift had a separate giver. But the Bible never offers a specific number of kings. It just refers to them in the plural.



The Gospels tie Baby Jesus to just two events in Bethlehem: His birth and His consecration in the temple at 6 weeks old. Matthew says that the magi arrived "after Jesus was born" at the "house" where He was. It's unlikely that Mary and Joseph stayed at the stable all that time.



The Bible doesn't explain exactly how, but the wise men knew Jesus was the "King of the Jews." Even though it's believed they were magicians or astrologers, they were overjoyed to find the baby and worship Him as King.

Every December, we give gifts to one another and gather in worship of the King. One way we can do both is through the practice of biblical stewardship—giving generously to others in gratitude for the blessings we have received. This Christmas, you might volunteer your time, update your estate plan to include your favorite charity, or give a year-end donation. Follow in the magi's footsteps and leave a holiday legacy that changes people's lives.
